February Board Meeting

—Decided to ask the congregation to re-approve the Master Plan for facility expansion because of the time which has elapsed since the congregation originally approved the Plan in 1992-93. The congregation will have an opportunity at the April 21 congregational meeting to review the Plan and to become familiar with issues in the Plan that would impact the review of proposals for the Abrams bequest. The congregation will then be asked at the June 9 meeting to re-confirm adoption of the Plan. The Board also decided to move forward on a survey of drainage on the property, which is required under our existing Use Permit for the Master Plan.

—Approved a draft contract to hire a Pre-school teacher. Will consider a proposal to hire a teacher to address the problem of childcare during congregational meetings.

—Approved a job description for the position of Choir Director so that it will be ready at such time as the congregation may decide to fund it. The Music Committee will submit the position for inclusion in this year's budget.

—Is in the process, under the leadership of Trustee Bruce Fihe, of appointing an Ad Hoc Committee on the Distribution of Abrams Bequest. The committee is being asked to review the proposals which were submitted by the congregation regarding the Abrams Bequest and to conduct this review in the context of the congregation's Integrated Growth Plan *Gather the Spirit, Harvest the Power*. Bruce is preparing ways to obtain input about the proposals and to present the pros and cons of the various large topics among them. The proposals and the Committee's input about them will be presented to the Board and then to the congregation for a final decision.

—Has asked the Ad hoc on Ministerial Housing to reopen its review of various options for ministerial housing which were presented to the Board in November. They will meet with Treasurer Bill Sampson because he has identified information which was not addressed in the committee's original report.

—Appointed Marylou Lamb as a member of the Committee on Ministry following the resignation of Jenny Wood.

—Decided to ask the congregation to expand the Committee on Ministry from three to five members because of the workload of the committee. The Reverend Pam would continue as an ex officio member. The expansion would require a change in the By-laws, and it will be presented to the congregation at the April 21 meeting.

President's Letter

Dear Friends,

Have you ever been asked the question, "Would you rather be right, or would you rather be loved"? Oftentimes a friend who is counseling me about a problem relationship poses the question to me and oftentimes, in the context of personal relationships, my answer is, "I would rather be loved." Certainly, I want my friend—or partner—to hear me, and I want him or her to understand me. But it isn't so critical, usually, that he or she agrees with me. Being "right" isn't the most important thing. Being heard is.

What about situations that don't involve an intimate, such as a classroom, or a meeting at work or—here at the Fellowship. Would you rather be right, or would you rather be loved? Do you sometimes not speak your mind for fear you won't be understood, or for fear your position is a minority position, or worse, for fear you may be alone in your opinion? And what is it you fear?

The opposite of love is not hate, but indifference. I realize that I am often silent not because I fear disagreement, but because I fear indifference. I fear that others will not care enough about the issue—or me—to engage in a discussion of our different perspectives. I fear indifference.

And I fear isolation.

Frankly, there are times when I suspect my opinion is not shared by others in the room. I have spoken in these situations and the response has been silence. I hear a silence of discomfort. I fear it is the silence of indifference.

We all want to be accepted and loved. And we all desire, I am convinced, to be accepted for who we are. Only when we speak out can others know who we are by what we say we value. But by speaking our values we expose ourselves and make ourselves vulnerable.

When others engage in respectful dialogue with me, whether or not it is in disagreement, I feel embraced. When others withhold engagement, I fear indifference. This is true in my personal relationships as well as in a large group.

It is also true that I need my intimates to share my values. There have been times when being "heard" isn't enough; there have been times when I would rather not be loved by a person because he doesn't share my deepest values. There have been times when I would rather be "right," than be loved.

Nominees for the Board

Board President....Ed Newman..."My parents were members of the All Souls Unitarian Church on Center Street in Santa Cruz until 1945 when my father died. My mother then returned to Jewish roots and joined the synagogue in Santa Cruz. Growing up I had some contact with All Souls occasionally pumping the organ on Sunday when I did not get out of the house early enough to go fishing. I am a second generation Unitarian and first generation Unitarian-Universalist. My wife and I have been members of this Fellowship since 1971 and I have served on many Committees over the years. It has been many years since I served on the Board of Trustees and I look forward to it"

Vice PresidentAnn McCrow...."I joined the Fellowship in 1985 shortly after moving to Santa Cruz from San Francisco with my husband Randy and two sons, Nathan and Leo. MONEYNOTES – from Bill Sampson

We are now three quarters through the fiscal year ending June 2002. What that means is we can pretty well see where we are likely to end up. In a word, it looks pretty good. Even though we passed a deficit budget in June last year, there is a good chance that we will come out almost even for the year.

The largest single item is our pessimism a year ago about the costs of energy to sustain our buildings. We all remember the outcry from San Diego about electricity bills, and we all had surprises on the cost of natural gas for heating. All of that led to budget allocation of \$8,000 for utilities expense. My best guess now is that we will end up at about \$5,600, a savings of \$2,400 compared to the budget.

On the income side, Sunday cash offerings look to be more than \$1,000 ahead of budget and we received almost 10% more than budget on the Auction and the Yard Sale. The only risk is that pledges may not be fully realized because a number of our members have employment problems.

The rest of the budget items run along within a total of about plus-or-minus \$1,000. I don't have any experience in these things, but it seems to me that ending up with less than 1% variance on \$200,000 total cash flow is pretty good.

Goals Set For 2002-2003

Fellowship members gathered in the sanctuary on March 3 after the service and engaged in a goal setting process that identified our top ten goals for the next fiscal year. The Board and the Committees will plan their focus and their activities for next year with these goals as their guide. Forty members and friends participated in the goal setting process. Claire Wright, Dean of the PCD Leadership School, facilitated the process.

The top ten goals for FY2002-2003 are:

(In order of priority as selected by members on March 3, 2002)

#1 Begin implementation of expansion plan. Adopt or revise Master Plan.

#2 Activate a membership committee now!!!

#3 Explore ways to deepen experience of Sunday morning services. To engage people emotionally and encourage people to become more committed and involved have more 'lay' contribution in planning and participating in the services.

#4 Establish good communication system for networking needs and services of all kinds, such as transportation, volunteer service, emotional support

#5(tied) Implement an interim space plan, i.e. address standing-room-only situation on Sun a.m. while we wait for the expansion.

#5(tied) Generate a visible presence and action in community including on campuses (UCSC, Cabrillo) through participation in parades, booths at events, political action.

#5(tied) Host internal community events for Fellowship to help foster interpersonal relationships, such as coffee houses, art events, dances, etc.

#8 Finish side patio.

#9 Create a clear, welcoming, well-publicized process to help interested persons become members.

#10 Charter buses, purchase shuttle buses.

Abrams Bequest Report

Recently I have heard a few folks ask, "What is happening with the money that Dee gave the Fellowship?" I am pleased to be able to give you an update on this. You should all be aware that the Board set this generous gift from Dolores Abrams aside to allow adequate time for any members of the Fellowship to submit proposals for the use of these funds. A total of 26 proposals were submitted, some of these proposals had multiple items listed in them. These proposals have been published in past issues of the Unicorn and are still available in the Office for review.

The Board has appointed an ad-hoc committee to review these proposals and submit a recommendation, for approval by the Fellowship. The members of The AD-Hoc Committee to Evaluate Proposals and Recommend Distribution of the Dolores Abrams Bequest (The Abrams Committee, for short) are:

We held our initial meeting Monday, March 18th and began the process of categorizing all the various items of the proposals and discussed ways of keeping you, the congregation informed about our progress. We will hold our second meeting on Monday, March 25th to continue categorizing the proposals. Where needed, we will conduct detailed cost research. Once we have the cost data in hand, we will begin to formulate our recommendations for dispersal of the Abrams Bequest moneys. These recommendations must be approved by the Board and then the Fellowship, just as our annual operating budget is.

The Abrams Committee will continue to provide the congregation with status reports as we go. One of the status reports will be at the April Congregational Meeting, with an opportunity for comments and feedback from the congregation. We plan to have at least a partial recommendation for your approval by the June Congregational Meeting.

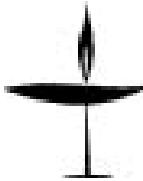
