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## In the Interim with Rev Ann Schranz

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The recent tragedy at Virginia Tech and the ongoing tragedy of the war in Iraq are sobering reminders that all is not well with the world. Let us take to heart the message of Edna St. Vincent Millay:

“Dirge Without Music” by Edna St. Vincent Millay

*I am not resigned to the shutting away of loving hearts in the hard ground.*

*So it is, and so it will be, for so it has been, time out of mind:*

*Into the darkness they go, the wise and the lovely.  
Crowned with lilies and laurel they go; but I am not resigned.*

*Lovers and thinkers, into the earth with you.  
Be one with the dull, the indiscriminate dust.  
A fragment of what you felt, of what you knew,  
A formula, a phrase remains, -- but the best is lost.*

*The answers quick and keen, the honest look, the laughter, the love, --*

*They are gone. They are gone to feed the roses.  
Elegant and curled*

*Is the blossom. Fragrant is the blossom, I know.  
But I do not approve.*

*More precious was the light in your eyes than all the roses in the world.*

*Down, down, down into the darkness of the grave  
Gently they go, the beautiful, the tender, the kind;  
Quietly they go, the intelligent, the witty, the brave.  
I know. But I do not approve. And I am not resigned.*

Whatever it takes, we must not become resigned to violence. Where do you find your strength to avoid the temptation of resignation? I hope that the Fellowship is one place that supports you in avoiding the temptation of resignation. For this to be true, it depends upon you.

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## New Board Elected and Plans for 2007-08 Ministry Voted

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**New Board:** The congregation voted unanimously at its April 22 Congregational Meeting to approve the following new Board members for 2007-08.



President - Marsha Hudson  
Vice President - Bruce Fihe  
Secretary - Marcia Heath  
Trustees - Jenny Wood,  
Randy James, Mel Cole.

These candidates were all nominated by the Nominating Committee except Marsha Hudson, who was nominated from the floor after the Nominating Committee reported it was unable to find candidates available to serve as President and Treasurer. The position of Treasurer remains vacant and will be referred to the Board for further action. Three additional Trustees who were elected last year will continue to serve their two-year terms.

### **Plans until Settled Minister Is Found:**

The congregation also expressed its preference to hire a full-time consulting minister during the period until a settled minister is found. If that option proves unavailable, the second choice is another full-time interim minister. Both of these options would involve hiring professional ministers for time-limited contracts of 10-12 months; the contract terms with a consulting minister are more flexible than those with an interim minister and would not prohibit a later decision to proceed to settled ministry. The third choice is a part-time consulting minister supplemented by lay-led Sunday services; the fourth choice is a period of predominantly lay-led Sunday services supplemented by visiting speakers and visiting ministers.

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## Committee On Ministry

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Hi, your Committee on Ministry met on April 4th, and it was a full meeting with our regular agenda, combined with our update and consideration of the unfortunate news that the UUFSCC did not end up with a settled minister candidate.

What we want to share with you this month is about an incredible opportunity for one or two of you. COM has the funds to share the cost of the *Pacific Central District's Leadership School* with one or two members who would like to attend this year. Leadership School will be the week of July 21-27 in Alamo, CA. 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## Social Action Committee News

***Did You Know?*** Humboldt County has passed an historic initiative that prohibits non-local corporations from making political contributions in county elections! The National Voting Rights Institute calls this “one of the most important local electoral efforts happening anywhere in the US. ...it will have profound ramifications for campaign finance reform proposals across the country.”

Ordinary people came together to address a very real problem – outside corporate money buying local elections. Perhaps the most important part of this initiative is that it joins a growing number of challenges to the legal doctrine of “corporate personhood.” The ordinance states “courts have illegitimately defined corporations as ‘persons,’” a doctrine that “denies the people of Humboldt County the ability to exercise our fundamental political rights.” Well, this doctrine is also denying the people of the US and of the world our fundamental rights, right? Can we, here in Santa Cruz County, pass such an Ordinance? Are we approaching the tipping point necessary to delegitimize this outrageous judge-made ruling? Could we start with Santa Cruz City? Paul Blue, Ruth Valdez, and Brian Heath will be exploring this question.

### ***John D. Isherwood Educational and Travel Grant:***

Hilda Berra and her daughters, Hayley and Carla, are the first recipients of the John D. Isherwood Educational and Travel Grant, to assist with her upcoming “Pastors For Peace Caravan to Cuba.” Our three UUF members will join this respected and well-known effort to bring medical supplies and computers to Cuba, protesting the 18 year US embargo against this tiny nation. In addition, the Berra family will see first hand the working of Cuban society and will return to share her experiences with the fellowship. John made this trip nine years ago.

John and Helen, members of the UUF for 35 years, feel the grant will make it possible for

members to broaden their exposure to social justice, environmental, and cross cultural diversity issues. This thousand-dollar grant will be given annually for at least three years. First consideration will be to members of the UUFSCC.

John, a retired physician, left England in the aftermath of WWII to travel the world with the belief if people knew each other's countries and cultures there would never be another war. He has worked for the World Health Organization in Latin America, the Sandinistas in Nicaragua, the Guatemalan refugees in Mexico, and has been a part of professional cultural exchange programs in Russia and Indonesia. It is his wish for this grant is to make it possible for the members UUF to expand their opportunities, to change themselves and their community.

## ***You Bring the Bologna!***

Starting May 1st, there will be a change in the ISSP program. We will continue to house and shelter our homeless guests on Sunday nights throughout the summer. However, we won't serve a full supper.

Instead, the men will eat at the Homeless Shelter prior to coming to our facility for the night. Since supper is served early at the shelter (3:30 or 4:00 p.m.), we will provide a snack that the men can fix and serve themselves. They are quite comfortable using our kitchen; and, they definitely know how to clean up afterwards!

Some ideas for "snack" food are sandwich fixings like bologna, sliced cheese, cut up chicken, or tuna salad; pizza; appetizers like taquitos, cheese poppers, nachos, etc; cheese and crackers; hard boiled eggs; soup and bread; fresh fruit; veggies and dip.

If you bring the lunchmeat and something cold to drink, I'll make sure we have bread, mustard & mayo, cookies, coffee. I can get these at the Food Bank; sometimes I can also get fresh fruit. Any leftovers, the men can take with them for lunch the next day. You may also bring the food on Sunday morning (put it on the bottom shelf of the fridge and mark it for ISSP) or you can certainly be here to greet the men when they arrive, with the coffee heated up and the drinks chilled.

And for those of you who really want to cook a full meal, let me know by the Tuesday prior to your date (426-6979), and I'll get a message to the men that a homemade supper awaits them. They are always so appreciative of whatever we serve.

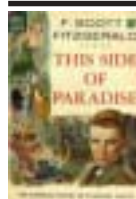
